Are you ready to be an online student?

Learning through an online course requires a different skill set that learning in a face-to-face class. It is important to know what you are getting into and to understand the commitment necessary for success in online learning. Take a few minutes to get a better idea of your readiness for online learning by answering the following questions.

If you answered "Yes" to ALL of the above questions, this is a good indicator that you have the tools to be a successful online learner and may be well suited to the online classroom environment.

If you answered "No" to any of the above questions, you may to reconsider taking online courses at this time. Online courses can be an exciting way to learn. Their convenience and flexibility appeals to students, but they are not for everyone. This is often because the student does not have the proper equipment or, more importantly, the personal skills and habits required of online students.
